- How might the schools customers for training want to re-engage after the lockdown is lifted.


At this time these uncertainties make it impossible for the Committee to take decisions about, for example, rescheduling any events, or a possible rebate on membership fees,

A number of committee members are also involved in assisting John with this task.





# Who Won? Who Won?



## TSSC Racing calculations and the Portsmouth Yardstick system By Phil Gamlen

Apart from the Annual Laser Championship all the racing at TSSC is of a fleet of dinghies of different classes.

At the end of the day's racing the Racing Officer can be seen in the Clubhouse with the racing results sheet, a calculator, a pen, and a press of eager sailors clamouring to know – 'Who won? Who won?'

So how does the Racing Officer work out the handicap adjusted order of finishing?

Every class of dinghy has a handicap number, its Portsmouth Yardstick (PY), that is a measure of the performance of a boat of that class when sailed around a course of all points of sailing with a steady wind. The PY is effectively a measure of the time it takes that boat to sail round such a course.

A large PY means the boat takes a long time, and a small PY means the boat takes a short time around that course.

The handicap adjusted time is calculated by dividing the actual elapsed time by

the PY number for that class. To avoid messing about with decimal points the par is set at 1000 (rather than 1.000) and class PY numbers vary from around 800 to 1400 (rather than 0.800 to 1.400).

On the day, a Race Officer will have recorded the actual times to finish the race for each competitor.

They will take an elapsed time, M minutes and S seconds, and first will convert that into a time T solely in seconds.

$$T \text{ (in seconds)} = (M \times 60) + S$$

The PY correction is then applied

$$T_c \text{ (corrected in seconds)} = (T/PY) \times 1000$$

The order of  $T_c$  for the competitors will thus give the handicap adjusted finishing order for the race.

Normally TSSC races are around 45 minutes in length. If a Laser and a Topper are racing each other and the Laser finishes after 45 minutes then to win, the Topper must finish within the time calculated below:

$$\text{the Laser PY} = 1100$$

$$\text{the Topper PY} = 1345 \text{ would have to sail the course in a time of } T_{\text{TOPPER}}$$

$$(T_{\text{LASER}}/PY_{\text{LASER}}) \times 1000 = (T_{\text{TOPPER}}/PY_{\text{TOPPER}}) \times 1000$$

$$T = ((45 \times 60) \times (PY_{\text{TOPPER}}/PY_{\text{LASER}}))$$

$$= 2700 \times 1345/1100$$

$$= 3301 \text{ seconds viz } \underline{55} \text{ minutes and } \underline{1} \text{ seconds}$$

.....Simples!

## Our Standard Operating Procedures

### Revision of Standard Operating Procedures

The 2019 RYA annual inspection of Catterick Garrison SC as a Recognised Training Centre highlighted a number of areas where improvements should be made to the documentation relating to the management of water - based activities.

This affects both Clubs as for many years CGSC has used the same set of SOPs for managing sailing as TSSC. This was considered a sensible move as CGSC is an affiliated member of TSSC we use the same water, facilities, share dinghies and more recently Dinghy Instructors.

The RYA Inspector was content that practical management of training of both official RYA courses and improver training by both clubs was satisfactory.

His concern was focused on the paperwork supporting the sailing as there were a number of inconsistencies, the relevance of some material was in question, it was dispersed in several documents and in a few cases time expired.

The Inspection was on behalf of CGSC and it identified some aspects directly affecting service personnel, which will be dealt with separately.



Another successful Training Course completed.

On that basis, John Knopp, the Chief Instructor of CGSC, offered to take the lead in collating all the available documentation from both Clubs and has proposed a revised layout, in a single document, to be called the TSSC Handbook.

It was recently agreed by the Committee to proceed on that basis and he will coordinate the efforts of several committee members to produce the new Handbook.


Once completed the Handbook will be published on the website.

Much of the management of training will then be possible electronically and members will have far greater visibility of how training operates.


